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Alternative therapist learns new skills in South America

Sue is a fertility 'miracle' worker

AN ALTERNATIVE therapist from Sheffield who has worked 'miracles' for couples struggling to conceive travelled to Belize to learn the art of an ancient massage which she says can be used as a further weapon in the fight against fertility problems.

Sue Calvert, known by her fans and followers as The Baby Maker, spent three weeks in the tropical rainforest learning the art of Arvigo

Her teacher was Dr Rosita Arvigo, who developed the abdominal massage techniques based on her apprenticeship with an old Maya healer called Don Elijio Panti.

Sue, from Millhouses, is now using the things she has learned with effective results.

Lisa Nokes, from Barnburgh, Doncaster, and her husband Paul had struggled to get pregnant for three

The 25-year-old first visited Sue to undergo reflexology treatment - a practice she has been carrying out for more than 20 years, helping hun-dreds of couples to conceive but when she heard about the new therapy she wanted to try it out.

Arvigo works using a deep abdominal massage.

Sue said: "It's about repositioning the internal organs, particularly the uterus.
"Most problems in fertility

originate from a misaligned womb, ovaries or fallopian tubes – by putting them back into their natural position you can often solve their problems."

Lisa, who works at Doncaster Council, said she and Paul, 38, were thrilled to discover she was pregnant in December last year after she had undergone three of the massage sessions, along with exercises

to carry out at home. She said: "We got married in January 2008 and by the September we had decided we wanted to start a family and began trying to get pregnant.

"It was disappointing to keep trying and trying and not get anywhere - particularly as it seemed like all our friends and family around us were having babies all over

"So we were over the moon to eventually get pregnant – and it was even funnier to discover that I'm due on the same day as my friend!

"I'm not a medical professional or anything and I don't really know the ins and outs of it all but this treatment gave us hope and I really believe it helped."

Sue, who is now one of just 23 trained Avigo therapists in the UK, said she loved her

She said: "It's such a great feeling when people tell you they're pregnant.

"It's such a life-changing thing, it feels wonderful to have played a part in it."

Tenants set for solar panel boost

COUNCIL and housing association tenants across the country could have free solar panels installed on their homes thanks to a South Yorkshire firm.

Solar Europa, in Dodworth, Barnsley, has struck a deal which could see up to 200,000 tenants receiving panels as part of a £1.2 billion deal.

The firm, which has secured financial backing for the project, says it will create up to 3,000 jobs for installation and maintenance teams across the country over the next four years.

It claims the panels could slash every tenant's electric-

ity bill by up to 50 per cent. The scheme could also help

the Government hit its carbon reduction targets.

David Hawkins, from the firm, said the deal was a

'win-win situation' for local authorities, housing associa-

tions and their tenants. He said: "Financial constraints have, until now, meant many housing associations and local authorities have been unable to invest in much-needed renewable tech-

"Installing solar panels as part of a wider energy-efficiency programme can help alleviate the problems of high energy costs for tenants.

"The average tenant who has solar panels installed can save as much as 50 per cent off their annual electricity bill and that saving can make a massive difference to the lives of many householders."

The deal also means up to 25 new jobs could be created in Barnsley in distribution and support roles.
